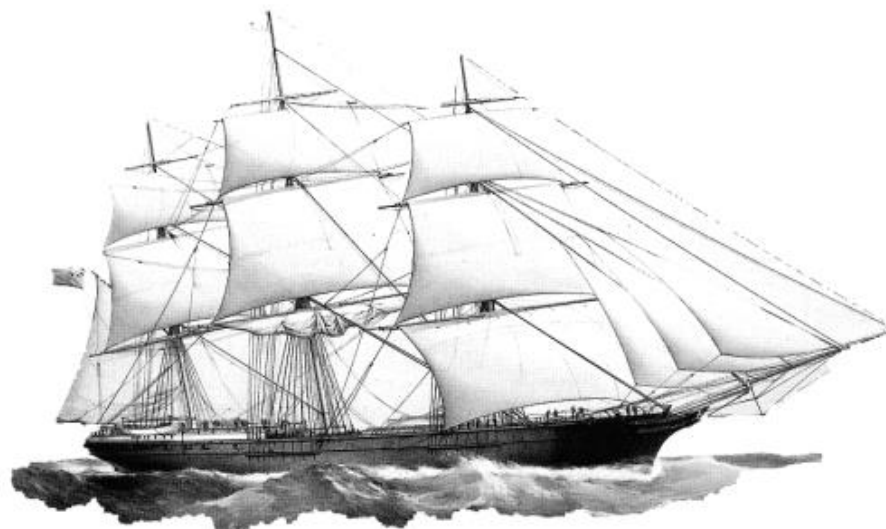

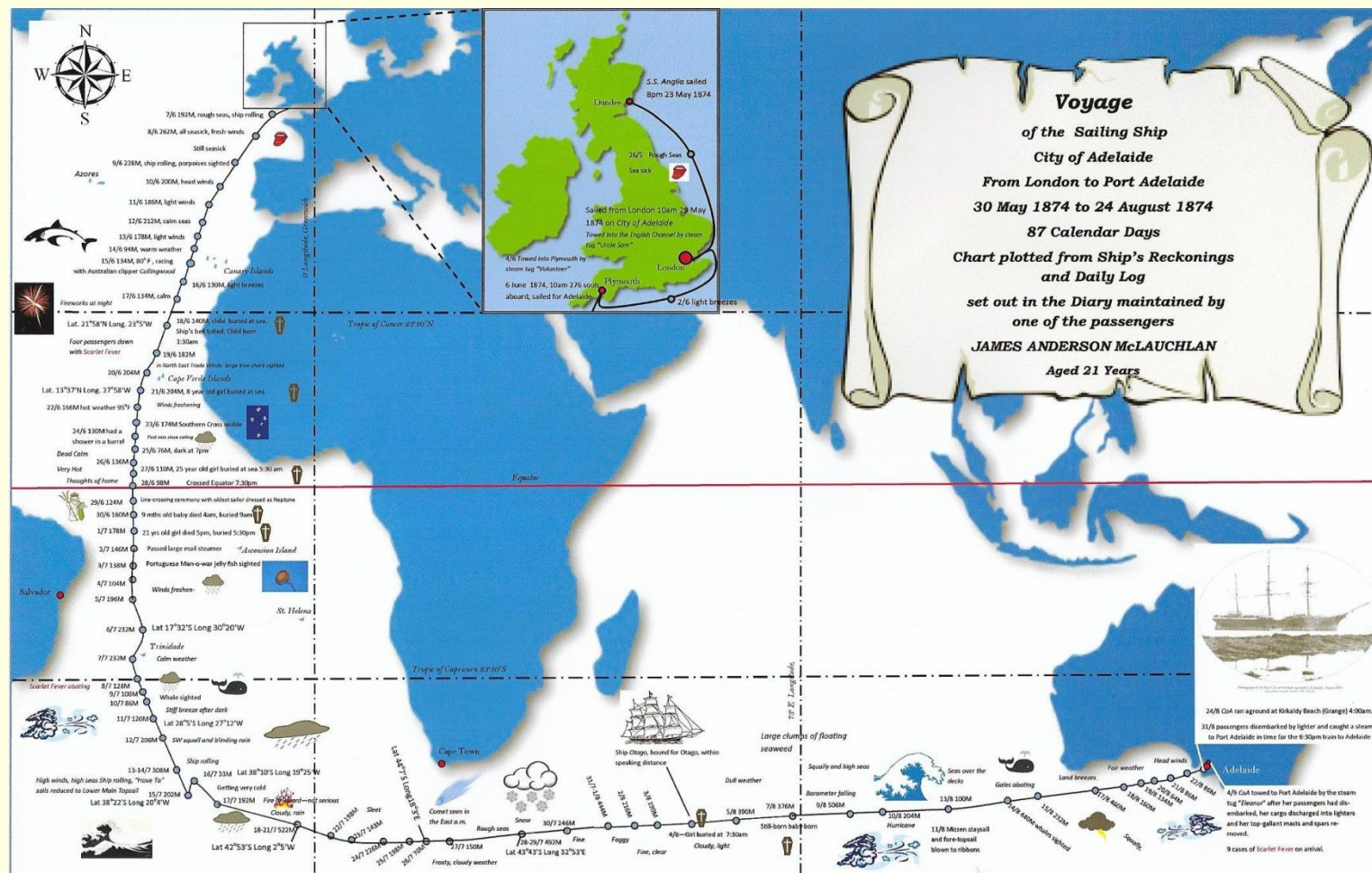


Descendants in South Australia

Built 1864, Sunderland UK

1864 - 1887 Twenty three return journeys between UK and Adelaide

1887 - 1893 Collier and North American timber trade

1893 - 1923 Isolation Hospital, Southampton

1923 - 1948 Royal Navy, Renamed 'HMS Carrick'

1948 - 1991 RNVR Club rooms, Scotland

1991 - 2013 Scottish Maritime Museum

2000 Adelaide campaign starts to save ship

2013 Ship lifted & moved

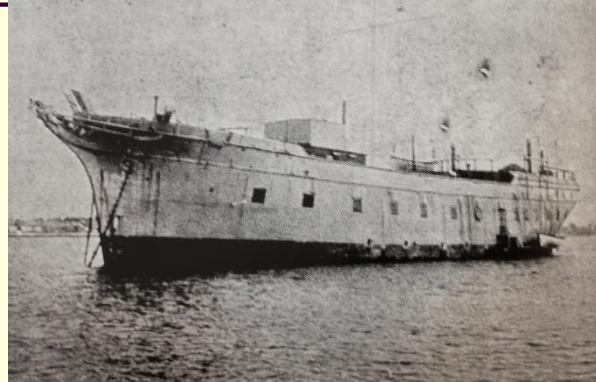

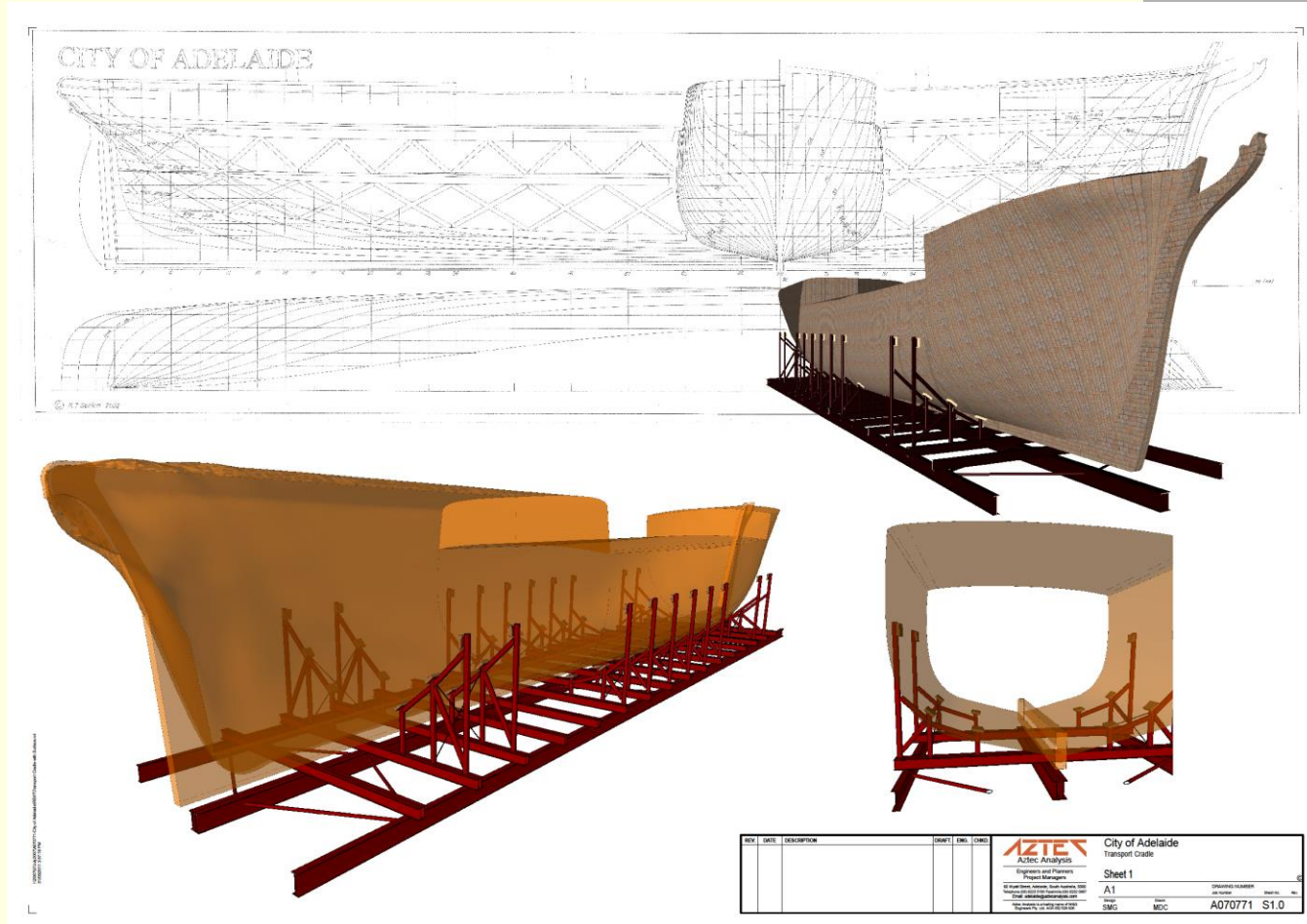
Who are we ?

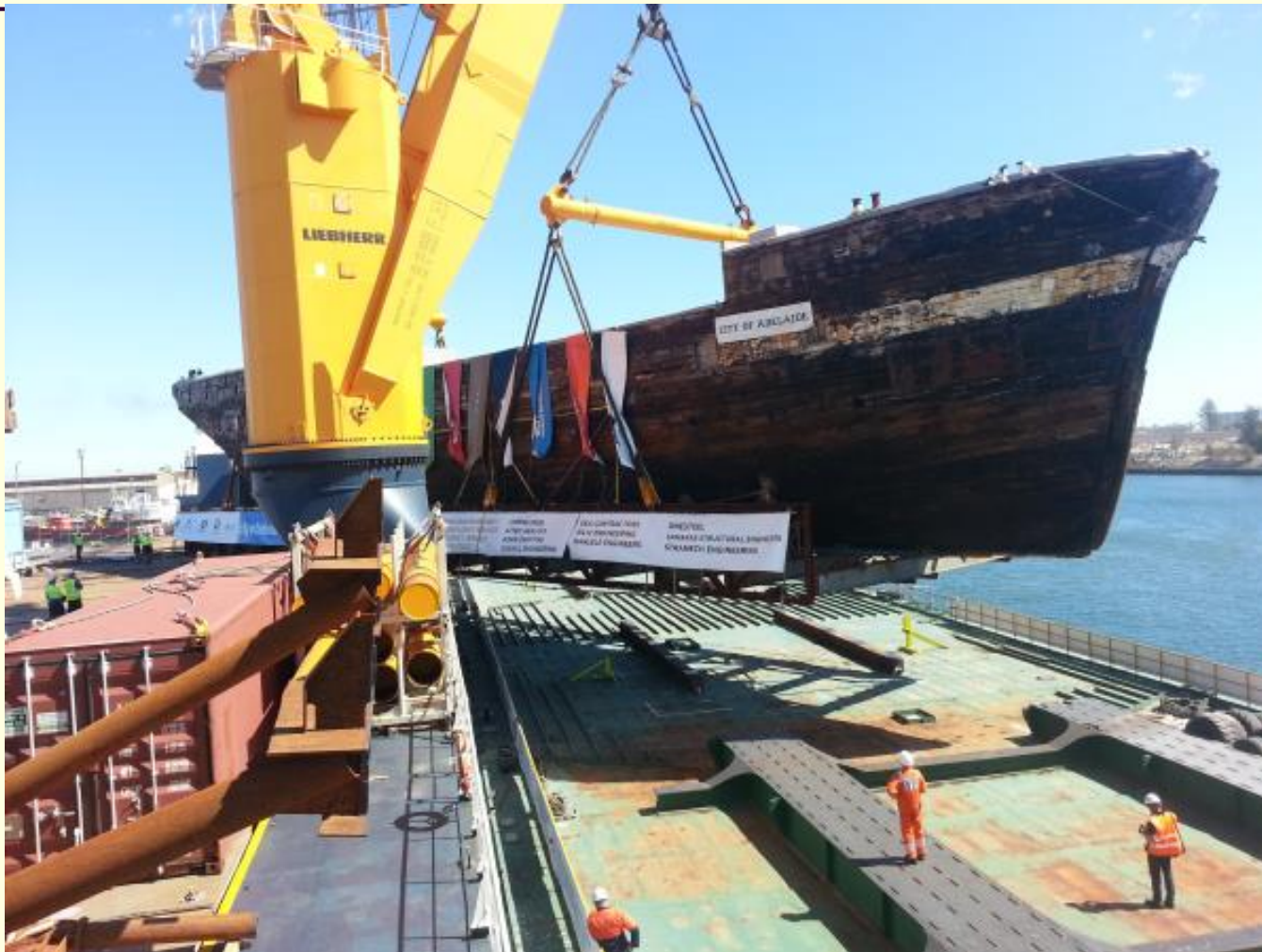

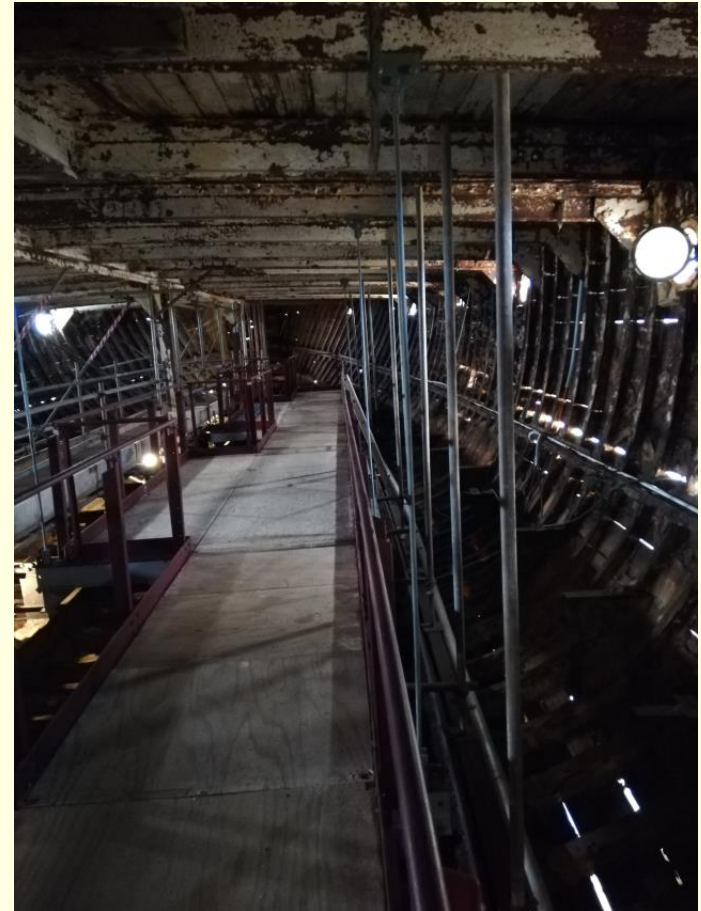

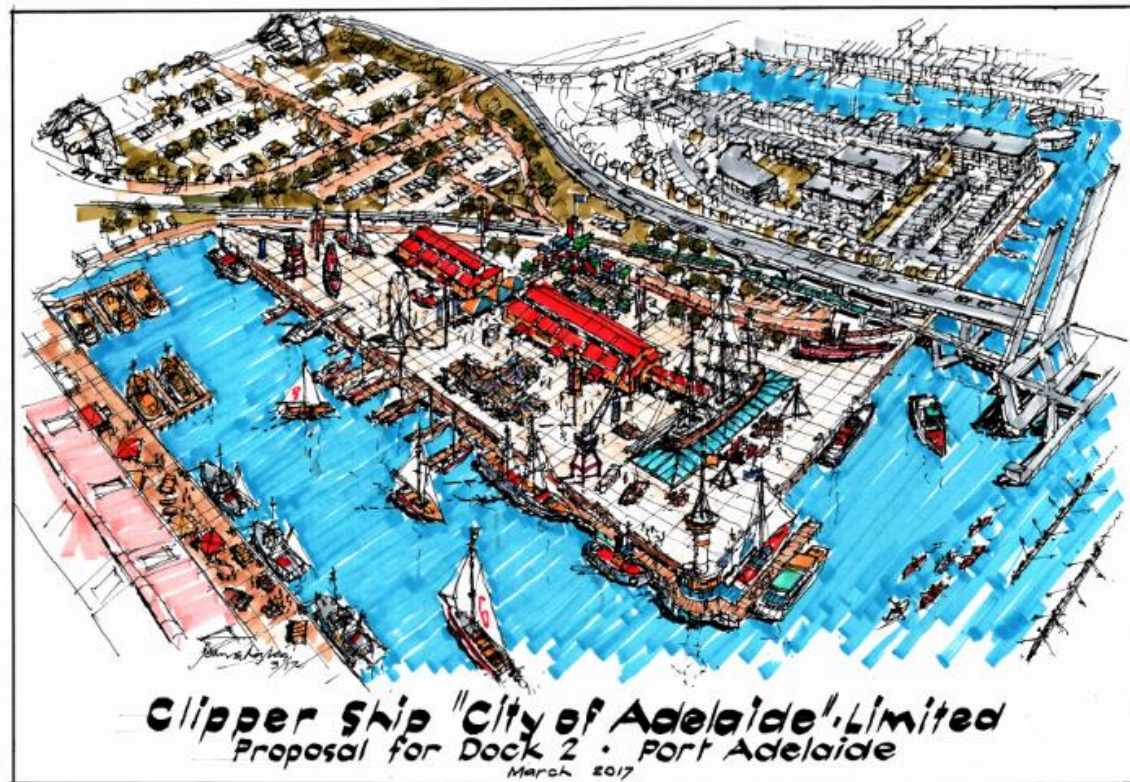
